
<u> Africa Regional Workshops</u>

In November and early December, IDS co-convened two Regional Sharing and Learning Workshops in Africa. The events aimed to take stock of, and strengthen, CLTS practice in the Africa region. Participants took stock of the progress of CLTS in the two regions and discussed emerging challenges and questions, as well as solutions and ways forward. 

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
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French version of Trainer's Guide/ Faciliter Les Ateliers De Formation Sur Le Terrain Pour L'ATPC: Guide de formation des formateurs

- Tell it like it is! CLTS always uses the crude word for shit in the local language. This may be shocking but makes the point that open defecation really is SHIT! Find out what others call it by consulting the International Glossary of Shit http://www.communityledtotalsanitation.org/resource/international-glossary-shit
- ❖ Want to know what's been added to the site since your last visit? The five most recent posts show up on the home page www.communityledtotalsanitation.org
- Country pages: If you visit the Where pages, you can see just how far CLTS has spread. Zoom in on the map to look at a continent or region or visit the pages of the country you are interested in http://www.communityledtotalsanitation.org/where.

- Languages We welcome contributions in languages other than English. Currently, we have materials in French, Spanish, Portuguese, Hindi, Bengali, Chichewa, Lao, Chinese, Arabic and Nepali. We would like to see more documents in different languages on the website!
